Vietnam War Gun Truck "Eve of Destruction"



With the end of the Vietnam War, the need for gun trucks disappeared and most were either scrapped or returned to cargo carrying. One truck, an M54 named by its crew "Eve of Destruction" was brought back intact and is on display at the museum. Following a long standing tradition, crews of gun trucks named their vehicles and painted mascots on them. The names they chose reflected the popular culture at the time. Eve of Destruction was named for a song of the same title.

Cybernetic Walker



The cybernetic walking machine was an experimental quadruped made by General Electric in 1965. The robot weighed 3,000 pounds, stands 11 feet tall, could walk up to 5 miles per hour and could haul a jeep out of a mud hole. Its four legs were able to support up to 500 pounds of cargo over extremely difficult terrain. It never made it out of testing phase. A large flaw was that it used 50 gallons of oil per minute, requiring it to be attached to hydraulic lines at all times.

Airgeep II VZ-8P



Developed to fulfill a U.S. Army Transportation Research Command contract for a flying jeep in 1957 the VZ-8 Airgeep was a prototype vertical takeoff and landing (VTOL) aircraft developed by Piasecki Aircraft. The flying jeep was envisioned to be smaller and easier to fly than a helicopter. The Army decided that the "Flying Jeep" concept was unsuitable for the modern battlefield, and concentrated on the development of conventional helicopters

de Lackner Aerocycle



The HZ-1 Aerocycle was an American one-man "personal helicopter" developed by de Lackner Helicopters in the mid-1950s. Intended to be operated by inexperienced pilots with a minimum of 20 minutes of instruction, the HZ-1 was expected to become a standard reconnaissance machine with the Army. Although early testing showed that the craft had promise for providing mobility on the battlefield, more extensive evaluation proved that the aircraft was in fact too difficult to control for operation by untrained infantrymen, and after a pair of crashes the project was abandoned. Of the dozen examples of the type ordered by the U.S. Army, only a single example of the HZ-1 has survived, and this aircraft is currently on display in the museum.

GEM Model 2500 Air Car



In November 1959 Curtis Wright developed the Model 2500 Air Car with the hope that a hovercraft would be accepted as an alternative to the family car. The hovercraft concept never caught on for general use, but the possibilities were not lost on the U.S. Army. The Army purchased two air cars in early 1960s and gave them the acronym GEM for "Ground Effects Machine." The GEM was a 360 hp vehicle which traveled at speeds of 20 to 38 mph at heights of 10 to 12 inches in the air

After several months of testing, the Army decided not to fund the project further, and it was abandoned in 1961.

Unlike the pre-development marketing images, the sleek lines were replaced with a rounded off box and it was big; 8' wide and 29' long and still only had room for two.

Denali had to wait for another day. 3 hours later the tow truck driver dropped me off at my RV and left for Fairbanks with my car. You learn to




roll with the punches when you live and travel full time in your RV. Something will break, plans will change, You can't let these things upset you, it's just another day.

As I sit here sipping my morning coffee, I realize it was one month ago today that I left Seattle for Alaska. That was 2630 miles ago. Next day it was on to Hope and Cache Creek on CA-1 then #97 to Prince George and #16 to Kitwanga. I drove the Cassiar Hwy, #37, from Kitwanga to where it meets the Alaska Highway near Watson Lake. I took side trips to Hyder, AK and Skagway, AK before heading north to Dawson City, BC. In Dawson I drove the RV on the free ferry to cross the Yukon river and drive the Top of the World road to Chicken AK, crossing the border into Alaska for the last time along the way. I headed south to Tok, AK and on to Fairbanks. I'll eventually make it south to Anchorage and back to the states after Labor Day but for now, It's back to Fairbanks, some 120 miles north to retrieve the Jeep when repairs are completed. I hope to see Denali someday but the weather was spectacular yesterday. I don't know if and when I will have another opportunity to visit the park with optimal weather conditions. Until then there is so much to see and so many places to go, I'm having trouble deciding what's next. I'll take that kind of problem any day! Which way is the wind blowing?

Cautionary Tales

We have a new addition to our newsletter as was recommended by Jan Austin. It's called "Cautionary Tales" and will include reports on issues that we as RVers need to be aware of on the road or through RV internet sites. Jan submitted an article in April to start us off and we hope we will be receiving others in the future. As an RV family, it is our responsibility to pass on information to each other and help us all stay safe on the road.

Below is an article for this newsletter from Steve Wood.



During our recent trip we had a problem with our air dryer. Before making the trip down the mountain in Asheville, NC, we had Interstate RV come to the campground and bypass the air dryer so we could get home safely. We were unfamiliar with the purpose of the air dryer but obviously didn't like the blinking red light on the dash. However, with the help from Steve Masterson (which is always awesome) and the work from Interstate, we came home safely and with yet another piece of very important information related to the maintenance of our RV. The below article was an excerpt from the internet and hope it's helpful.

".....On the larger Motorhomes air is used to apply the brakes instead of brake fluid. In order to do this, the motorhome needs a compressor to compress the air which is stored in the air tanks. This is at a pressure of around 120 PSI. The air is then used to apply the brake.

One important factor is that the air that comes from the compressor has to be dry. If the air contains any moisture, it can freeze the air system in the winter months, or corrode the brake components.

In order to achieve dry air, the compressor passes through an air dryer before it is stored in the tanks. When air is compressed it becomes hot, then as this hot air cools down moisture is created. The job of the air dryer is to remove this moisture by passing it through the base of the air dryer casting, which removes a high proportion of this. Following this, the semi-dry air enters a replaceable cartridge of the dryer, this cartridge contains desiccant which absorbs moisture. This moisture then stays in the cartridge.

Cautionary Tales (continued)

The cartridge has the same usable life on it as a large goods vehicle does, although would be very difficult to estimate how long one would last on an American Motorhome. On a large goods vehicle that has an air dryer fitted, the filter would need to be replaced on every large service around 90,000km (56,000 miles). If applied to an American Motorhome you may never need to change it, and you may say "so what".

The desiccant in the replaceable cartridge is housed in a textile bag which has a habit of deteriorating; allowing the desiccant beads to enter the air system, or the desiccant can become water logged which then lets water into the air system.

As a guide, the cartridge should be changed every 3 to 4 years if outside metal casing could start to corrode badly. The cartridge case houses the full 120 PSI air pressure, so any weak point can and will cause a large air leak......"
